














Reasons why a book is the perfect gift

As they do so, they also need to find out how to say 'goodbye' to one another in all of the country's 11 official languages.

But just as Sara starts to feel sad, she discovers that 'goodbye' can be the start of something new, something wonderful. Join her and find this out for yourself too.

This is another delightful story of rhyming verse, accompanied by charming illustrations, and a must for all young South African children. And if parents/ grandparents/carers aren't sure how to pronounce 'goodbye' in all 11 official languages, there is a digital link to the text, narrated by the author herself, to guide with authentic pronunciation.

Tell us a bit about yourself outside of being a writer?

Hmmm tricky one, lately I think writing is all I do. I do love to dance. And have very serious dance parties with family.

What is your favourite thing about being a writer?

I experience the world through words. I process through writing, words allow me to express who I am - and are a way for me to share who I am with others.

What or whom do you draw your inspiration from?

I draw inspiration from my own experiences, in relationships with others. What I write about usually has some personal connection - either something I have explored, am currently exploring or wish to explore.

What is your creative process?

The process is a cycle. Excitement at the idea, anxiety at having to get something down, blind panic as time ticks by, calm

as I write by my favourite tree in the garden, ease as I allow the story to flow through me, excitement as the story unfolds, devotion to see it through to completion, anxiety at having to submit it to the publisher, ease as we move into the editing phase. And then absolute joy.

Why did you decide to write a book about the different ways to say hello and goodbye in South Africa? Hello was written with the intention that every South African child (and the inner child in adults) recognises their inherent worth and that of another. Goodbye is about embracing change, expressing the sadness in letting go, but also recognising the joy in being open to something new.

What is the one message you would like to convey to your readers?

Who you are is beautiful. What you feel is important.



Real food - conscious living

Butternut chicken subs

WHAT YOU NEED

2 whole butternuts, halved lengthways and seeds removed

Olive oil

Salt and pepper

1 cup shredded leftover cooked chicken

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 tablespoon coconut oil

 $1\!\!/_{\!\!2}$ cup pumpkin seeds, toasted

½ cup fresh basil, roughly chopped, plus extra to garnish

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup grated hard cheese

(e.g. organic or grass-fed cheddar, parmesan)

1 teaspoon ground paprika

WHAT TO DO WITH IT

1 Preheat the oven to 180°C.

- 2 Rub the butternuts with olive oil and season the flesh with salt and pepper.
- 3 Place the butternuts skin side down on a baking tray and bake for 30-45 minutes, until a fork can easily be inserted.
- **4** Leave them to cool long enough so that they can be handled. Using a spoon, scrape out the flesh into a bowl, making sure to keep the butternut skins intact for use later.
- **5** Add the shredded cooked chicken, cinnamon, coconut oil, pumpkin seeds, more salt and pepper and the basil to the bowl of butternut and mix everything together until well combined.
- **6** Using a spoon, scoop the butternut and chicken mixture back into the butternut skins. Sprinkle over the grated cheese evenly and sprinkle over some paprika.
- **7** Increase the oven temperature to 200°C. Bake the filled butternuts until the cheese has melted and parts of the butternut start to crisp up. Garnish with extra basil before serving.

Don't Be Shy, Bushbaby Avril van der Merwe

Too long has the bushbaby been side lined in literature!

These furry, nocturnal animals are perfect storybook heroes, as Avril van der Merwe demonstrates in *Don't be shy, Bushbaby*, aimed at kids aged three to six.


In fact, so powerful a protagonist is Bushbaby that he's the star of the show, even though his first appearance is only in the second half of the book.

The animals in the jungle are curious about Bushbaby; they never see him. They assume he's shy because he keeps to his hidey-hole all day. Giraffe, Monkey, Warthog and the others try to entice Bushbaby to come out

to play, but he doesn't respond. Meanwhile, Owl watches.

But when the other animals have gone to sleep, the big-eyed creature emerges to scamper, chatter, and snack the night away – like a true extrovert. His vibrant night-time activities jump off the page thanks to Heidi-Kate Greeff's warm, bold illustrations, which bring out the personalities of the colourful characters.

The message is clear: others may judge you but what they believe is irrelevant as long as you are true to your nature. And there will always be someone who gets you – just as Owl understands and accepts Bushbaby.

Vengeance, lies and family secrets cast a long shadow in Karen M. McManus's thrilling and twisty new mystery YA novel.

With her talent for creating riveting plot twists and unreliable characters, Karen M. McManus's *The Cousins* is told from the perspective of Milly, Aubrey and Jonah Story, three cousins who haven't seen each other in years.

And why would they, when their parents have barely spoken to each other after being disinherited by their mother for reasons they still struggle to understand years later.

When the grandchildren are invited to spend the entire summer at their elusive and enigmatic grandmother's resort, it's a chance



for the cousins to bond and finally meet the mysterious matriarch who has been such a puzzle to them all these years.

When they arrive all is not what it seems – and the teens soon discover that the Story family's legacy is one that's mired in deeply rooted secrets; secrets that some would prefer being left alone.

The Cousins by Karen M.

McManus is a delightful and intricate mystery that's both clever in its set up and in its execution.

At its heart it's a story about vengeance, the dangers of buying into the hype of your own family legacy and the far-reaching consequences of being blinded by privilege and entitlement.


















Slime Stress Balls

Make some clear slime and squeeze it into a balloon to make your own stress balls to play with!

YOU WILL NEED

FOR THE CLEAR SLIME

- * 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- * 120 ml (4 fl oz) warm water
- * 140 ml (5 fl oz) clear craft glue
- eyewash it must contain boric acid and sodium borate

FOR THE STRESS BALL

- * balloons
- * fruit or vegetable net bag





Put the bicarbonate of soda and water into a bowl and mix in the clear glue.



Beat in small amounts of eyewash until the mixture turns gloopy. Add more eyewash if it is too sticky!






